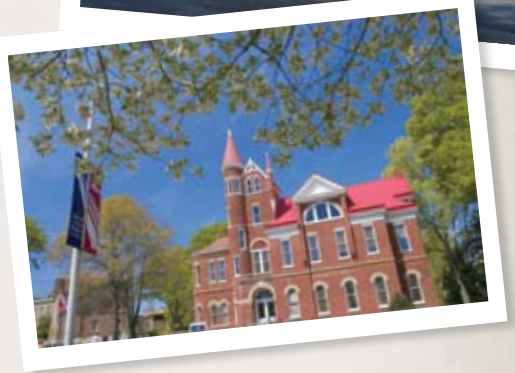
History

Chartered by the Mississippi Legislature in 1844, The University of Mississippi opened its doors to 80 students in 1848. Also affectionately known as Ole Miss, the university was established as a liberal arts institution. It now offers degree programs in the College of Liberal Arts and nine professional schools: School of Accountancy, School of Applied Sciences, School of Business Administration, School of Education, School of Engineering, Graduate School, School of Law and School of Pharmacy. The university also operates campuses at the DeSoto Center in Southaven, the Advanced Education Center in Tupelo, the Grenada Center at Holmes Community College, the Booneville site at Northeast Mississippi Community College and The University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson.



The Campus

Although the main campus comprises 640 acres, the layout of the academic buildings is compact, allowing students plenty of time to get from one building to another between classes. More than \$250 million in public and private funds has been spent in the last 14 years to renovate or construct new facilities on the Ole Miss campus, including residence halls, the performing arts center, sports venues both large and small, as well as academic buildings.



Oxford

The city of Oxford, with a population of just under 19,000, combines the safety, charm and friendliness of small-town life with urban amenities and excitement. *USA Today* named Oxford a "Top 6" college town, and Turner South Television says attractions from the historic Courthouse Square to William Faulkner's Rowan Oak are part of what makes Oxford so distinctive. An independent bookstore *The New Yorker* magazine described as being as good as or better than any in New York City, a bounty of independently owned and nationally recognized eateries and fine dining establishments, and dynamic visual and performing arts venues help give Oxford its urban personality. But if you want a jolt of city life, Oxford is just 75 miles away from Memphis, Tenn.

ADMISSIONS

Freshman Admission Requirements

New freshmen may be admitted upon completion of the College Preparatory Curriculum (CPC) with one of the following:

- * 3.2 GPA on the CPC
- * 2.5 GPA on the CPC and a 16 on the ACT or 760 on the SAT (Critical Reading and Mathematics only)
- * 2.0 GPA on the CPC and an 18 on the ACT or 860 on the SAT (Critical Reading and Mathematics only)
- * Meet certification requirements for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). This option is available to all freshman applicants.

Mississippi residents who do not meet the admissions requirements may enter the Academic Screening Stage, which consists of counseling and testing.

Social Science	3	U.S. history, world history (substantial geography component), 1/2 unit in government, 1/2 unit in economics or geography.
Advanced Elective	2	At least two of the following, one of which must be in foreign language or world geography: Foreign language, world geography, fourth-year laboratory-based science, fourth-year mathematics.
Computer	1/2	Computer as a tool, not keyboarding applications* <i>*Computer competency requirement may be met through course work or through a statement of competency from the high school.</i>
Eighth-Grade Units	1	Algebra I or first-year foreign language taken in the eighth grade will be accepted for admission provided the course content is the same as the high-school course.

Limited exceptions to high-school unit requirements may be available. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions and Enrollment Services.



Application Checklist and Deadlines

- * Submit an online application by visiting www.olemiss.edu and clicking on Apply Online. If you are unable to apply online, please contact the Office of Admissions and Enrollment Services to request a paper application. A \$35 application fee for Mississippi residents or \$50 for nonresidents is required.
- * Request high school or college to send official transcripts.
- * Have official ACT/SAT scores sent electronically by the testing agency. All applicants should submit required materials well in advance of the term for which they intend to enroll. Nonresidents of Mississippi applying for first-year admission for the summer or fall terms should mail all application materials no later than April 1. Applications postmarked after April 1 will be evaluated on a competitive, space-available basis.

International Applicants

International applicants may use the standard application or, for faster processing, contact the Office of International Programs (ipadmiss@olemiss.edu) and request a special packet that includes complete information on requirements and the additional forms needed for admission of international students.

Applying for Housing

Students must gain admission to the university before applying for housing. Admission is offered throughout the year on a rolling basis (beginning in October for summer or fall applicants). Housing applications are avail-

able online through the Online Services system for admitted and enrolled students. All housing-related questions and concerns should be directed to Student Housing and Residence Life. Note that all freshmen live on campus.

Immunization Requirement

All students born after January 1, 1957, must submit proof of two immunizations for measles, mumps and rubella prior to registering for classes. Medical History forms are available online at the Student Health Services Web site: www.olemiss.edu/depts/stu_health.

Orientation

All new freshmen and transfer students must attend an orientation session to prepare for enrollment at the university. At Ole Miss, orientation includes academic advising and registration for classes—so it's an essential part of starting your college career at The University of Mississippi. Each admitted student will receive orientation registration information during the semester prior to his or her declared term of enrollment.

FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Application Procedures

The University of Mississippi Application for Undergraduate Admission is the automatic application for Academic Excellence Scholarships for entering freshmen. Scholarship offers will be made beginning in December until the first day of fall semester 2009. Other merit-based scholarships require acceptance to the university and submission of the online Entering Freshman Scholarship Application by the priority date of December 1. (Applications must be submitted no later than March 1.) To apply for departmental scholarships, please contact the department in which you will be majoring for scholarship availability and application information.

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and submit it to the federal processor. Be sure to list The University of Mississippi and our federal school code of 002440 on the FAFSA. First-time applicants can request a paper FAFSA by calling 800-4-FED-AID or file online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Student Checklist

- Receive an admission acceptance letter from the university, including Ole Miss Student ID number and WebID.
- Submit the online Entering Freshman Scholarship Application by the priority date of December 1.
- File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form; priority date is February 15.
- Seek other types of scholarships, such as scholarships from outside resources or departmental scholarships.
- Accept your financial aid award online via Check Your Status link on the financial aid Web site.
- Notify the Office of Financial Aid as you receive outside aid (non-University of Mississippi awards).
- Retain copies of all materials and university information for your personal records.
- Check your application status 24 hours a day at www.olemiss.edu/mystatus.

Grants

MISSISSIPPI EMINENT SCHOLARS GRANT (MESG)

Grants of \$2,500 per year are available to Mississippi residents as entering freshmen who are designated as National Merit/Achievement Finalists/Semi-finalists OR who achieve an ACT score of 29 or higher (or comparable SAT score). All students must have a 3.5 or higher high-school grade-point average. Full-time enrollment is required. Applications must be completed online at www.mississippi.edu/riseupms/financialaid-state.php. All requirements must be completed by September 15, 2009.

MISSISSIPPI TUITION ASSISTANCE GRANT (MTAG)

Grants of up to \$500 per year for freshmen and sophomores and up to \$1,000 per year for juniors and seniors are available to Mississippi residents. Full-time enrollment is required. All students must have a 2.5 or higher high-school grade-point average and an ACT score of at least 15 (or SAT equivalent). Applications must be completed online at www.mississippi.edu/riseupms/financialaid-state.php. All requirements must be completed by September 15, 2009.

SUMNERS GRANT

Residents of Attala, Carroll, Choctaw, Montgomery and Webster counties in Mississippi are eligible for grants ranging up to \$4,000 per year. Residency criteria apply. Application information can be obtained from the financial aid Web site at www.olemiss.edu/finaid/sumners.html.



The University of Mississippi Scholarships 2010-11

The University of Mississippi Application for Undergraduate Admission is the automatic application for Academic Excellence Scholarships for entering freshmen. Please have test scores sent electronically to the Office of Admissions and Enrollment Services. Our ACT code is 2250, and our SAT code is 1840. Also note that The University of Mississippi only accepts the composite score; superscoring is not accepted. The tests must be completed prior to enrolling at The University of Mississippi for scholarship consideration.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIPS—RESIDENT

\$2,000 - \$20,000 (*\$500 - \$5,000 per year*)

Entering freshmen, minimum 3.0 four-year high-school GPA and a minimum 24 ACT (1090 SAT verbal/math). To apply for these scholarships, students must be admitted to the university and complete the online Entering Freshman Scholarship Application.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIPS—NONRESIDENT

\$5,000 - \$52,176 (*\$1,250 - \$13,044 per year*)

Entering freshmen, minimum 3.0 four-year high-school GPA and a minimum 26 ACT (1170 SAT). To apply for these scholarships, students must be admitted to the university and complete the online Entering Freshman Scholarship Application.

Entering freshmen who served in the top elected position in their high schools as the president of the entire Student Body (or Student Council). Students must provide documentation of status to the Office of Financial Aid.

EAGLE SCOUT/GOLD AWARD

\$1,000 (first year only)

Entering freshmen who have achieved the levels of Eagle Scout or Gold Award. Students must provide documentation of status to the Office of Financial Aid.

Other Scholarships

Interested students are encouraged to contact individual departments for detailed information regarding amounts and stipulations of scholarships as well as application procedures. Amounts vary and may include nonresident tuition awards.

NONRESIDENT ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP*

\$6,000 (\$1,500 per year, per alumnus parent, toward out-of-state tuition)

Nonresident students whose parent(s) received a degree from the university or who attended at least six regular semesters (fall/spring only).

\$4,000 (\$1,000 per year)

Entering freshmen who are named valedictorians or salutatorians. Please submit a letter to the Office of Financial Aid from principal or counselor confirming status.

CHANCELLOR'S LEADERSHIP CLASS

\$1,000 (first year only)

School official must nominate student using form that is sent to all Mississippi and many out-of-state high-school principals by mid-February.
